## IHSMA Festivals Defined

In January of 2006, the Executive Committee of the Iowa High School Music Association adopted a policy that states, "With the exception of the All-State Music Festival, IHSMA Festivals are assessments of individual or group achievement whereby every participant has the opportunity to achieve the highest rating."

## IHSMA REGISTRATION / PENALTY POLICY

Events sponsored by the Iowa High School Music Association have established registration deadlines. Both the Registration Deadline and the Penalty Deadline are online purchase order/check number submission deadlines. Entries submitted online after the online purchase order/check number registration submission deadline must include the standard registration fee for that particular group or individual PLUS the $50 \%$ penalty fee (to a MAXIMUM of $\$ 25.00$ ). Once the penalty online purchase order/check number submission deadline has passed, schools may still register for participation by paying the following additional penalties: Marching Band - $\$ 100.00$ per entry; All-State $-\$ 100.00$ per student; Show-Jazz Choir/Jazz Band - $\$ 100.00$ per entry; Large Group - $\$ 100.00$ per entry; Piano - \$20 per entry. Solo/Small Ensemble - \$18 per entry. These late entries will be scheduled at the convenience of the festival host.

## RECORDING POLICIES OF THE IHSMA

Recording services are provided for the All-State Festival. Cameras and recorders will not be permitted in the performance area for this event.

Personal video cameras will be permitted at the State Marching Band Festival, Show Choir/Jazz Choir/Jazz Band Festival, Solo/Small Ensemble Festival, and Large Group Festival; however, the site management may designate a specific area from which to record. In performance areas where congestion is a concern, only small hand-held video cameras will be allowed (no tripods). US Copyright Law permits each performer the privilege of archiving their performance. US Copyright does not allow the sale of this video footage to anyone, or the distribution of this video footage to any non-performer.

The IHSMA will not utilize personal audio or videotapes in disputes over a judge's ruling.

## CONDUCT OF PARTICIPANTS/DIRECTORS

It is the clear obligation of participants, directors, and administrators to practice the highest ideals of cooperation and ethics of competition. The audition host/festival manager has the authority to take whatever immediate steps might be necessary in instances of questionable conduct. The Executive Committee shall have full authority to penalize any member school whose representatives may be, in the opinion of the committee, guilty of a violation of this obligation.

## NEWLY-ELECTED DISTRICT ADVISORY GROUP MEMBER

## ADMINISTRATOR PASSES ACCEPTED

## 2007 Harris Poll Survey Results

Harris Interactive ${ }^{\circledR}$ conducted this study online within the United States between October 9 and 15, 2007 among 2,565 adults of whom 1,928 had music education. Figures for age, sex, race/ethnicity, education, region and household income were weighted where necessary to bring them into line with their actual proportions in the population. ## New Harris Poll Links Music Education to Advanced Studies and Higher Incomes

Harris Interactive today released an independent poll which shows a positive association of music with lifelong educational attainment and higher income. Nearly nine in ten people ( 88 percent) with post graduate degrees participated in music education. Further, 83 percent of those with incomes higher than $\$ 150,000$ or more participated in music.

## ATTENTION!! ADMINISTRATORS AND MUSIC DIRECTORS!!

The following is the sanctioning policy as amended on June 26, 2006. It is imperative you check closely any music competition sponsored by any agency other than the IHSMA office. If it has not been approved, your school will be in violation of this policy if you participate.

## SANCTIONING POLICY OF THE IHSMA <br> (Effective June 26, 2006)

Recognizing that school music programs have a community commitment that extends beyond the confines of strictly school events, and, recognizing also that there are events that extend beyond the desire or intent of the Iowa High School Music Association to administer, the Executive Committee of the Iowa High School Music Association, acting under the authority granted in the constitution, sets forth the following regulations and recommendations for governing the participation of its member schools in competitive or evaluative events sponsored by agencies other than this Association during the academic year.

1. Member schools may participate in other competitive/evaluative music events provided they also participate in the IHSMA program in instances of same-day programs. This does not apply to bands wishing to compete in parade competitions on the same date as the IHSMA State Marching Band Festival.
2. Member schools, and students representing member schools, may not compete for cash prizes other than out-of-pocket expenses.
3. Competitions and evaluative festivals, in lowa, will not be approved if classification guidelines do not comply with those established by the IHSMA. The only exception permitted is an open competition with all schools competing in the same class.
4. The eligibility regulations of the lowa High School Music Association are in effect for any competitive or evaluative music event that is sponsored-approved by the lowa High School Music Association. With the exception of the main keyboard player accompanying Show Choirs, Jazz Choirs, Concert Choirs, Solos and Small Ensembles, all participants must be eligible students, in good standing, and enrolled in grades 7-12 in their respective schools. In instances of early graduation, the student loses eligibility at the conclusion of the last scheduled day of attendance.
5. Programs must be open to all students, regardless of race, creed, sex or national origin.
6. Competitive or evaluative music events, originating in lowa, must have the written approval of the IHSMA office.
7. Multiple-day events must make use of at least one day of the weekend.
8. Participation, by any member school, in out-of-state competitive or evaluative music events shall be the sole responsibility of the involved school district provided Regulation No. 1,2, and 4 of the above are abided.
9. Sanctioned events held on days where there is a conflict with a Unified Activities Federation Calendar event are required to cooperate with schools wanting to participate in both events. If a pattern of non-cooperation is established, sanctioning may be withheld from that event in the future.

It is further RECOMMENDED that:

1. Whenever possible, competitions or evaluative events should be held on non-school time (weekends, vacation, etc.)
2. Schools should emphasize a 125 -mile of half-day limitation for events scheduled on a weekday and a 300 -mile limitation for events scheduled on weekends.
3. Events sponsored by non-educational agencies should be scrutinized with extreme care. Sponsoring agencies should submit, upon request, a financial accounting to demonstrate that they do not profit unreasonably from such sponsorship.
4. Activities scheduled on the Unified lowa High School Activities Federation calendar should be given priority in relation to programs sponsored by outside agencies.

ACT TESTING CONFLICTS
Directors need to be alerted to the ACT test dates for the present semester. Careful planning will need to be done by students to avoid conflicts with one of our festival dates. The February 9 date conflicts with our Piano Festival. The April 12 date conflicts with our Class 4A/1A Solo/Small Ensemble Festival. In 20082009 the ACT test dates will conflict with All-State Auditions, and the Class 2A Solo/Small Ensemble Festival. Taking ACT's in June, October, or December will alleviate this problem.

## AWARDS PROGRAM

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS: The Iowa High School Music Association will recognize larger ensembles - Marching Band, Show/Jazz Choir, Jazz Band, Orchestra, String Orchestra, Mixed Chorus, Concert Band, Bass Clef Chorus, Treble Clef Chorus -that excel in academic achievement and also participate in the IHSMA festival designated for that particular ensemble. This award program features two levels of designation:

## Distinguished Academic Achievement: GPA = 3.25-4.00

Excellence in Academic Achievement: GPA = 3.00-3.24
So awards can be distributed expeditiously, the GPA of the first semester will be employed so ensembles performing at the Large Group Festival in May can receive their awards prior to the conclusion of the school year. The IHSMA is now employing a plaque recognition program in place of the certificate program used in previous years. This plaque is an appropriate 16 " X 20 " plaque that contains twelve spaces for ensemble recognition and will be forwarded to the deserving schools upon receipt in the IHSMA office of the application form and verification of participation in the festival can be made. Applications are included with this bulletin mailing. They may also be found on our web site: www.ihsma.org. Schools wishing to replace their certificates from previous years with plaques may purchase plaques from IHSMA using the Academic Achievement Award Plaque Order Form for previous year's awards.

INDIVIDUAL AWARDS FOR ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT: The IHSMA has individual 8 " x 10 " certificates that may be purchased for individual members of any large ensemble qualifying for the Academic Achievement Award. These are available, in quantity, from the IHSMA office at a cost of $\$ .10$ each. Indicate the number desired on the Academic Achievement Award Form and include payment.

AWARDS TO RECOGNIZE ACCOMPLISHMENT: The accomplishment of high school music students can be recognized via an awards program available through the lowa High School Music Association. Pins and medals are available for individuals and plaques recognize the accomplishment of larger ensembles.

Division I pins/medals feature a blue ribbon and insert on a gold background;
Division II pins/medals feature a red ribbon and insert on a silver background;
Division III pins/medals feature a white ribbon and insert on a bronze background.
All-State: The Iowa High School Music Association offers plaques for schools to honor students accepted for participation in the All-State Music Festival.

Outstanding Performance Awards: The Executive Committee has created an "Outstanding Performance Award" for performances in the Piano Festival and the Solo/Small Ensemble Festival that are truly outstanding in nature. Each adjudicator is granted the privilege of designating one performance from the festival as "outstanding". No adjudicator is mandated to designate a performance if one is not observed. The Outstanding Performance Award must be given if a judge awards one or more performances the maximum number of points. Recipients will receive a certificate from the IHSMA office reflecting this award. Additional certificates for individual performances, or for members of an ensemble so designated, are available from the Association office at a cost of $\$ 2.00$ each. To order additional certificates, send payment with request to the association office.

## TEACHER TENURE AWARD

The lowa High School Music Association has developed a Teacher Tenure Award to recognize persons who have spent a significant number of years instructing lowa high school musicians. To be eligible for this award, teachers must have completed 30,35, or 40 years of contracted high school music instruction in the state of lowa or any year in excess of 30 upon notification of intentions to retire. This Tenure Award certificate will also be awarded for individual year increments in excess of 40 years. Upon submission of a letter of verification attesting to the years of experience signed by both a high school administrator and the director, an appropriate certificate will be presented at the All-State Festival Concert. The letters of verification must be received in the IHSMA office by October 1 in order to receive the award at the coming festival.

## SELECTION OF FESTIVAL LITERATURE

This Association believes student improvement and educational gain are the two greatest purposes for offering festival programs. The selection of legitimate literature must be a high prerogative with directors to ascertain these ends are accomplished. The selection of "popular" music for either the Solo/Small Ensemble or Large Group Festival purposes is to be discouraged.

Large Group Vocal Ensembles and Concert Bands are required to perform, in its entirety, one selection from the Required Music List. Concert Bands may petition the Literature Review Committee to allow the performance of literature not found in the Prescribed Literature List by submitting a Literature Petition Form-Add, score, and recording to the IHSMA prior to February 1. March 1 will serve as the notification date concerning the acceptance or denial of a petition. ## DUPLICATION OF PERSONNEL REGULATION

In cases where schools enter multiple large ensembles of the same type (ie. 2 show choirs, 2 concert bands, 2 orchestras, etc.), students can be eligible in both ensembles provided a change of basic instrument family takes place. Those basic instrument families are defined as: woodwind, brass, percussion/rhythm, string, and voice.

## FESTIVAL ATTIRE

Contemporary fashions provide for a tremendous variety of attire for high school students. Believing appearance contributes positively to a student's conduct, personality and performance capabilities, attire appropriate to the situation should be encouraged by member schools and their directors.

## APPLAUSE AT SPRING FESTIVAL PROGRAMS

Applause is permitted at any of the Solo/Small Ensemble Festival events. Applause will be permitted wherever deemed appropriate at Swing Choir/Jazz Band Festivals. For the Large Group Music Festivals, applause is permitted only at the end of each school's performance.

## SPECTATORS WELCOME AT ALL FESTIVAL CENTERS

Public performance is a part of the festival setting and, from that context; spectators are encouraged and welcome at all programs sponsored by this Association. Requests to empty a center of spectators will NOT be allowed at any festival program sponsored by the IHSMA.

## "CONFIDENTIAL REMARKS TO THE DIRECTOR"

Adjudicators are provided with "Confidential Remarks to the Director" forms. Frequently situations present themselves that require some type of confidential reporting to the director. The adjudication form is basically for student perusal and these remarks do not belong on that form.

## ADJUDICATOR EVALUATION FORMS

The IHSMA Office urges careful, considerate, accurate completion of the Adjudicator Evaluation Forms. These evaluations are compiled for office records and returned, anonymously, to the involved adjudicators. Evaluations aid this office in determining whether or not an adjudicator will be rehired. These forms are now available online for each of our festivals.

## PERMISSION TO ARRANGE/OUT-OF-PRINT FORMS

Permission to arrange selections or to perform out-of-print music can be found online by searching the appropriate publisher's website. Generic forms can be found on the IHSMA website: www.ihsma.org. These may be duplicated in any quantity desired.

## INCLEMENT WEATHER

The IHSMA Office will make its best attempt to re-schedule festival programs that fall victim to inclement weather. It must be realized, however, that school calendars could create a situation in which cancellation is the only alternative. If a site operates, it becomes the responsibility of the registered school to be in attendance. No make-up festivals will be arranged, nor will entry fees be refunded, for those schools that elect not to attend. Festival managers are directed to initially postpone the festival program for an hour or so before canceling entirely on a particular date.

## ALL-STATE MUSIC CAMP GUIDELINES

Any person/agency/institution hosting an All-State Music Camp within the State of Iowa must comply with the following criteria, which have been developed to insure a consistent, equal opportunity for camp operators/sponsors and participating students:

1) Any All-State Music Camp desiring to function within the state of lowa must obtain the annual written approval of the IHSMA office prior to sending out any notification to schools.
2) Copies of any promotional material related to the camp (fliers, brochures, letters, etc.) must accompany the camps written request for approval.
3) No All-State Music camp may begin operations prior to August 1.
4) Camps are encouraged to rehearse only with the supplied materials; i.e., pronunciations, rehearsal directions, etc., provided with the music/Association bulletin. Telephone calls should not be directed to the All-State Chair, All-State Conductor or the Executive Director of the IHSMA.
5) Camp fees cannot include the purchase of the employed music. Obtaining the All-State music remains the responsibility of the member school.

## POLICY REGARDING STUDENT PERFORMANCES WHEN THEY ARE NOT DIRECTLY REPRESENTING A MEMBER SCHOOL

Participation of students in musical organizations other than the ensembles of a member school, be the participation with or without pay, is not covered by the eligibility rules of this Association except in the case of competitive events. Such participation is the responsibility of the local school administrators in these matters.


- Linguistic intelligence: The capacity to use words effectively, orally or written.
- Logical-Mathematical Intelligence: The capacity to use numbers effectively and to reason well.
- Spatial Intelligence: The ability to perceive the visual-spatial world accurately and to perform transformations upon those perceptions.
- Bodily-Kinesthetic Intelligence: Expertise in using one's whole body to express ideas and feelings and facility in using one's hands to produce or transform things.
- Musical Intelligence: The capacity to perceive, discriminate, transform, and express musical forms.
- Interpersonal Intelligence: The ability to perceive and make distinctions in the moods, intentions, motivations, and feelings of other people.
- Intrapersonal Intelligence: Self-knowledge and the ability to act adaptively on the basis of that knowledge.

## U.S. COPYRIGHT LAW AND IHSMA FESTIVALS

For a consistent interpretation of the law, this document serves as a guideline as schools/directors/students approach state festival performances. ANY PERFORMANCE OBSERVED IN VIOLATION OF THE COPYRIGHT LAWS WILL BE DISQUALIFIED!

IF AT ALL POSSIBLE, the student/accompanist/adjudicator should be provided with a legally printed, copyrighted, published edition. There is no possible violation if this is done. This can be borrowed from a neighboring district.

## HOWEVER

When this cannot be done, several options lie open to the director. Judges are instructed to accept, as a legitimate score, any of the following:

1. A copied score with an attached, signed statement from a music supply house stating that the music is on order and will be delivered and paid for upon its arrival. This order SHOULD BE initiated at least 30 days prior to the festival date.
2. A copied score with an attached, signed statement from either the publishing company or composer, verifying the duplication/arrangement that is present. (The IHSMA website has Permission to Arrange and Permission to Perform Out-of-Print Music application forms available online.)
3. A copied score containing the application for either Permission to Arrange or Permission to Duplicate Out-of-Print music that has been originated at least 30 days prior to the festival for which no response has been received. (This would demand the originator of the forms duplicate and keep a copy at the time of the original request.)
4. Original Composition. This must contain a statement from the composer granting permission to perform and/or duplicate.
5. Transposition. Transposition of vocal solo or ensemble literature not available in the needed key is permissible provided the student/director supply a copy of the original arrangement from which the transposition was made.
6. Reductions for instrumental ensembles: A director must construct a reduced score for instrumental ensembles for which no conductor's score is available.
7. Accompanists may play from duplicated music in a binder provided they give the adjudicator TWO legitimate copies of the score.

Keep in mind that ANY AND ALL arrangements, other than legitimate scores, must have a Permission to Arrange form attached granting approval. Directors cannot rewrite parts to accommodate a specific solo or ensemble without granted permission. "Cuts" made in any selection, in order to meet maximum performance time specifications, should be made only to avoid unneeded repetition and not to avoid overly difficult passages. "Emergency provisions" of the law allow for duplication of music that has been lost/destroyed without sufficient time to secure replacement. It does assume a legal copy will be obtained to replace lost item(s). Iowa music stores with the capacity to generate music in the desired key via Notestation equipment should stamp each selection with an embossing stamp assuring adjudicators copyright fees have been paid in the purchase of this service.

ALL-STATE LOST AND FOUND
There are several personal items returned from the All-State Festival. These items may be claimed by calling (515) 432-2013, and providing identification. After March 1, 2008, remaining items will be donated to the Salvation Army.

## SOLOISMALL ENSEMBLE FESTIVAL REGULATIONS

1) STUDENT ELIGIBILITY
A) In addition to IHSMA Constitution Article VI, Section 1 (p. 48), participation is restricted to students from member schools of the lowa High School Music Association and enrolled in grades 7-12 only. Participating students must be in good standing in their school and currently enrolled and eligible in one of the following: wind/percussion concert band or orchestra; vocal - mixed chorus/treble clef chorus/bass clef chorus; strings - orchestra or concert band. To be considered a member of the above ensemble, a student must be enrolled and in attendance at a minimum of $50 \%$ of the scheduled rehearsal sessions. Accompanists need not be members of the large ensemble. Membership in large ensembles is required for all school districts where such ensembles exist. (see Article VI of the Constitution.) Students enrolled in 7-8 grade band or chorus (whichever is appropriate) and in attendance at $50 \%$ or more of the rehearsals meet the enrollment requirement for participation in the IHSMA Small Ensemble Festival. Pupils below $9^{\text {th }}$ grade may compete in ensemble events; however, it must be understood that a majority (50\%) of the ensemble must be of at least $9^{\text {th }}$ grade status. Pupils below $9^{\text {th }}$ grade are NOT permitted solo performances at this event.
2) REGISTRATION AND EXPENSES
A) Registration for this festival will be online. Instructions for registering online will be available on the IHSMA website.
B) FEE: $\$ 9.00$ per entry, solo or ensemble. All registration fees are to be sent to Alan S. Greiner, Executive Director, Iowa High School Music Association, P.O. Box 10, Boone, Iowa 50036-0010.
C) Registrations must be completed by the established deadlines. Purchase Orders will be accepted. No registration fees will be returned or refunded under any circumstance after the registration deadline has passed for Solo/Small Ensemble Festival. Changes in registration will be accepted, without penalty, through the penalty deadline date by notifying the IHSMA office, in writing, of the correction. Changes in registration after the penalty deadline will be accepted provided the school pays a penalty of twice the registration fee (\$18 per entry). Additions in registration will be accepted after the penalty deadline but will carry an additional penalty of double the registration fee. Example: one additional entry would cost $\$ 9.00$ (original registration fee) + \$4.50 (50\% late penalty up to \$25) + \$18.00 (additional penalty after penalty deadline (double registration fee) $=\$ 31.50$ per entry. Failure by member schools to abide by their registration form and the established rules of the Association will result in disqualification of the entries involved and a letter of reprimand to the administration of that school, directing communication with the involved director. Each school will be responsible for payment for the events registered plus any penalties incurred.
D) The previous registration limitations associated with this festival have been removed. Schools are permitted unlimited registration into this festival.
E) Expenses incurred by a participating school (meals, lodging, etc.) should be paid by the participating school. The Iowa High School Music Association assumes no responsibility in this regard.
3) SCHEDULING
A) The "initial" schedule will be available online shortly after the penalty postmark deadline. It is IMPERATIVE that involved staff jointly decides upon the location of their various
performances and submit online or return the initial schedule to the IHSMA office by the specified date.
B) Scratches must be reported to the manager's office upon arrival at the festival site.
4) PERSONNEL
A) SOLO PERFORMANCE GUIDELINES
1. A student is permitted only one vocal solo performance.
2. Instrumentally, a student is permitted multiple solo performances provided they change instrument and selection for each registered entry.
B) VOCAL AND STRING DUET GUIDELINES
3. a student may perform in one like and one unlike vocal or string duet.

Vocal Duet Like = two female or two male singers.
Vocal Duet Unlike = one female singer and one male singer
String Duet Like = any two identical string instruments
String Duet Unlike = any two string instruments that are not identical
C) WIND/PERCUSSION/MIXED DUET GUIDELINES - students may perform in multiple wind/percussion duet entries as long as they change music and either partner or instrument.
D) DUPLICATION OF PERSONNEL/MUSIC

1. No student may participate in two ensembles of the exact same type (i.e., two trumpet quartets, two girls trios, etc.) If a student is found to have performed in two ensembles of the same type, both adjudication forms will be withheld and both performances disqualified.
2. Students may participate in different types of ensembles listed under the same general heading (i.e., A student may perform in one flute trio, one flute quartet, and one flute quintet under the general heading, "Flute Ensemble").
3. Students may not perform the same piece of music more than once during the festival day.
4. All vocal events require memorization. Instrumental events may perform with music.
5. Wind/Percussion entry clarification:

- Ensembles are restricted one player to a part
- Ensembles may not be conducted
- Choir entries may have multiple players on a part
- Choir entries may be conducted


## 5) LEGITIMATE INSTRUMENTS

A) The French Horn will be considered a woodwind instrument only in a Mixed Woodwind Ensemble.
B) The only electronic instruments permitted for Solo/Small Ensemble Festival is the electric bass guitar for Percussion Ensembles, and the Vibraphone.
C) The Executive Committee has ruled that the human body is NOT a percussion instrument. Directors should exclude compositions that utilize exclusively special effects (hand clapping, body slapping) as the primary compositional device.
D) Wind/Percussion ensembles may substitute instrumentation if there is a transposition of octave (flute/piccolo) or like key (oboe/flute). This regulation does not pertain to directed choirs.
6) COPYRIGHT
A) Refer to the section entitled "The Copyright Law and IHSMA Festivals" previously cited in this bulletin.
B) The Executive Committee has ruled that schools should not photocopy copyrighted material. Judges will be instructed to withhold all ratings where a violation of this
occurs. Performances in violation of this directive will be disqualified by the Executive Director.
C) Repeats cannot be added to a work without securing permission to arrange from the publisher.
7) ADJUDICATOR'S SCORE - PROVIDED BY SOLOIST/SMALL ENSEMBLE
A) All participants must provide a copy of the score for the convenience of the adjudicator. Performances that do not provide a legitimate score as outlined in the "U.S. Copyright Law and IHSMA Festivals" section previously cited in this publication will be withheld. *See exceptions under the COMMENTS ONLY heading.
B) ALL MEASURES MUST BE NUMBERED. Performances not complying with this regulation will not be allowed to perform until these criteria are met.
C) A director MUST construct a reduced/condensed score for instrumental ensembles for which no conductor's score is available. Individual parts will not be accepted. Performances not supplying the adjudicator a reduced/condensed score for instrumental ensembles may be heard for "comments only."
D) Instrumental directors should be cautioned against providing adjudicators with a piano score that contains the instrumental line for solo performances. Such copies normally do not contain the dynamic markings, phrasing, articulations, etc.
E) "Cuts" made in any selection, in order to meet maximum performance time specifications, should be made only to avoid unneeded repetition and not to avoid overly difficult passages.

## 8) "COMMENTS ONLY" PERFORMANCES

Performances employing this option should write "Comments Only" BOLDLY across the top of the adjudication form. If asked to provide this type of evaluation, NO numbers are to appear in any circle NOR is the adjudicator to provide any indication of a divisional rating.
At the discretion of the director, any event may appear for "Comments Only". "Comments Only" are required for the following events:
A) Any event that is unable to provide a score for the adjudicator's convenience.
B) Instrumental solos that are written with an accompaniment and then performed unaccompanied.
C) An ensemble confronted with inappropriate numbers due to illness, injury, emergency, etc., has the option to perform "for comments only". They may also elect to perform for a rating provided their membership can provide all of the necessary parts as demanded by the score.
8) TIMING OF EACH SOLOISMALL ENSEMBLE PERFORMANCE
A) Performances must be a minimum of $21 / 2$ minutes in length. Adjudicators are mandated to lower the final score by one point for each 15-second segment of violation.
B) Performances have a maximum time limit of either 5 or 6 minutes (Chamber Choirs and Chamber Orchestras are 8 minutes.) The maximum time limit is solely for the purpose of keeping the festival schedule operating smoothly.
C) PERCUSSION: A percussion solo performance may include two works for different instruments (i.e., a snare drum solo and marimba solo) to meet the minimum time limit. The student may not play either piece as an individual solo at another time during the same festival.
D) Timing of each Solo/Small Ensemble performance will begin with the first note performed and will run continuously until the last note of the performance. The clock will not stop between movements or selections.
E) Participants and conductors must stop as soon as the official timekeeper signals the end of the performance time. The rating for a performance in violation will be withheld for referral to the Executive Director.
F) Performers employing more than one selection should be instructed to move directly to the second selection with only a noticeable pause.
G) In case of mechanical difficulty in a performance, the participants shall retire and return later for the performance. The normal time allowance will be accorded for the second performance.

## 9) INTRODUCTION OF THE EVENT

Participants are encouraged to introduce their selections immediately prior to their performance. Introductions are not considered a portion of the allotted performance time.

## 10)ACCOMPANIMENTS - ACCOMPANISTS

A) The method of presentation of vocal performances - accompanied or a cappella - is a decision of the director. However, judges will be instructed to address the appropriateness of an accompanied performance of a cappella literature in the "Other Performance Factors" of the adjudication form.
B) Solos with written accompaniment other than the piano may be performed with suitable instruments (up to 6 including the main keyboard instrument) provided the players, other than the main keyboard player, are eligible students.
C) Any ensemble may be accompanied by piano if there is a piano part/contribution written and desired by the composer. Exceptions will be noted under specific caption criteria. A reduced score will not be allowed as a piano part.
D) Any school-approved accompanist may serve as an accompanist on the main keyboard instrument. Only one person may perform the part intended as the main keyboard accompaniment.
E) The maximum number of accompaniments permitted by one person is 20 .
F) Chamber Choirs (vocal) may employ additional accompanying instruments up to 6 in addition to the main keyboard instrument.
G) Accompanists, for their own convenience, may copy scores and place them in a binder. However, as proof of their compliance with U.S. Copyright Law, two legitimate copies of the score must be presented to the adjudicator.
H) Instrumental selections written with an accompaniment must be performed in that manner unless emergency conditions prevent the accompanist from being present. In that situation the performer then has the option of performing for "Comments Only."
I) Smart Music Accompaniments (or any other intelligent/interactive computerized accompaniment programs as approved by the IHSMA Executive Committee) will be allowed on a 1-year trial basis for the 2007-2008 IHSMA Solo/Small Ensemble Festival for any wind/percussion entry where accompaniments are allowed. See the Smart Music Accompaniments section on p. 26 for a complete listing of requirements and suggestions.

## 11)ADJUDICATION FORMS

Adjudication forms must be completed in every detail - school name, soloist, selection, etc. by the participating school prior to the event. They are given to the door keeper along with the adjudicator's score(s) just prior to their performance.

## 12)VIDEOTAPING - APPLAUSE

A) Video-taping of performances is allowed. Tri-pods will only be allowed in performance facilities where space is not an issue, otherwise only hand-held video-taping devices will be allowed. See Recording Policies of the IHSMA on page 2 of this bulletin.
B) Applause is permitted and encouraged following the completion of each Solo/Small Ensemble event performance.
13)ADMISSION AND SPECTATORSA) Public performance is a part of the festival setting and, from that context, spectators areencouraged and welcomed at all programs sponsored by the IHSMA. Requests toempty a center of spectators will NOT be allowed.
B) There is no admission charged for this festival. Host sites will employ a suggesteddonation box for spectators. The suggested donation will be Adults \$3, Students \$1.

9-24 singers - May be directed - must sing literature appropriate for Chamber Choir. Upto six additional instruments will be allowed for accompaniment.

All Solo/Small Ensemble performances must be a minimum of $21 / 2$ minutes in length Vocal Solo 5 minutes
Small Ensembles-Strings
All Solo/Small Ensemble performances must be a minimum of $21 / 2$ minutes in length String Duet 6 minutes
String Ensembles of Like Instruments ..... 6 minutes
3-9 string players performing on string instruments required by the score. Accompanimentpermitted if required by the score.
String ensembles of Unlike Instruments ..... 6 minutes
3-9 string players performing on string instruments required by the score.Accompaniment permitted if required by the score
Piano-String Ensembles 6 minutes
3-9 players, pianist must be an eligible student Wind/String Ensembles ..... 6 minutes
3-9 players performing literature on instruments required by the score.
Accompaniment permitted if required by the score.
Chamber Orchestra ..... 8 minutes10-16 players; may include winds; piano permitted as one of the 16 ;pianist must be an eligible student; May be directed.

7-24 players - may be directed - may not be accompanied - performing music suitablefor the ensemble. The substitution of parts to other flute instruments is permitted providedpermission has been obtained to transpose, if necessary.
Clarinet Choir. 6 minutes
7-24 players - may be directed - may not be accompanied - performing music suitablefor the ensemble
Saxophone Choir 6 minutes
7-24 players - may be directed may not be accompanied performing music suitable for the ensemble
Woodwind Choir 6 minutes

## Solos-Band

All Solo/Small Ensemble performances must be a minimum of 2 1/2 minutes in length (All band solos have a maximum time limit of 5 minutes)
Clarinet Family Solos: Includes only Bb, Eb, Alto, Bass and Contra-Bass/Alto Clarinets Saxophone Family Solos: Includes only Soprano, Alto, Tenor and Baritone Saxophones Flute Family Solos: Includes only members of the flute family
Double Reed Family Solos: Includes only Oboe, Bassoon and English Horn
High Brass Family Solos: Includes only Cornets, Trumpets, Flugelhorns and French Horn
Low Brass Family Solos: Includes only Trombones, Euphoniums and Tubas
Percussion Family Solos: Includes only Snare Drum, Tympani, Keyboard, Steel Drum and Multiple Percussion

## SmartMusic \& IHSMA Solo/Small Ensemble Festival

SmartMusic is an interactive, computer-based tool for musicians featuring challenging exercises, instant feedback tools, and more than 30,000 accompaniments. SmartMusic's exclusive Intelligent Accompaniment follows the student's spontaneous tempo changes like a good human accompanist, allowing the student to be free to express him or herself.

## Requirements:

- Schools may use SmartMusic Accompaniments for the IHSMA Solo/Small Ensemble festival;
- Schools must provide own equipment and operator;
- Events must stay within established time schedule;
- In the event of an equipment problem, the event may retire and reappear later.


## SmartMusic \& IHSMA Solo/Small Ensemble Festival - cont.

## Recommended equipment:

- A laptop or battery powered desktop with SmartMusic (directors will need to keep the operating system up and running as to not boot up or restart in the performance center);
- speaker system;
- microphone (optional);
- headphones (recommended - directors will not be able to test/adjust the system in the hallway without headphones);
- cart system;
- a power cord to reach designated outlet within the performance room for the speaker system.

Centers will remain specific to instrument and adjudicator expertise. Directors, operators, and students must be fluid in the use of the technology. The operation of the technology must not distract from the student performance or adjudication process.
It is recommended in the initial stages of implementation of SmartMusic within the Festival setting that specifics of interaction between student and technology be left to the discretion of director and student. The Intelligent Accompaniment setting should be dependent upon the selection of repertoire and the individual student. Directors are requested to document the repertoire selection and the interactive setting used within the performance. Following the Festival, directors are requested to submit this information to the Concert Band Affairs Committee for review and guidance in establishing norms for the settings of the Intelligent Accompaniment.
Host schools are asked to have an additional room to be used as a "Power Station" to plug in stations. Host schools will not be expected to provide equipment, software, or technical assistance in the use of SmartMusic at the Solo and Ensemble Festival.

## SOLOISMALL ENSEMBLE FESTIVAL RATING SYSTEM Adjudicator Guidelines

These percentages are not mandated levels but rather should reflect the adjudicator's expectations of an average festival day. Adjudicators are to award NO plusses or minuses or half-point ratings.

DIVISION I: (25\%-40\%) A superior performance. Outstanding in nearly every detail. Nearly every detail - they are not perfect, but they should be as good as students for this particular event can perform.
DIVISION II:(40\%-55\%) An excellent performance. An extraordinary performance in many respects but not worthy of the highest rating because of minor defects in performance and/or ineffective interpretation. Ineffective interpretation might be - dynamics are happening, they are just not musical.
DIVISION III:(10\%-25\%) A good performance. Shows accomplishment and promise but lacking in finesse, interpretation and the essential qualities necessary for a higher rating. Dynamics are no longer happening. The lack of finesse is obvious and many essential qualities simply are not present.
DIVISION IV:(2\%-10\%) A fair performance. Not worthy of a higher rating because of basic weaknesses in many of the fundamental factors of a good musical performance. You are getting a legitimate effort; there simply is very little musical that is happening. Coordination is obviously lacking and, at times, you may wonder if they will finish together.
DIVISION V:(0\%-3\%) A poor performance. Obviously lacking preparation, practice and observation of the necessities of a good festival performance. You are not getting a legitimate effort.

## ADJUDICATOR INFORMATION

1. Solo/Small Ensemble Festival performances will be evaluated by a single adjudicator; all other festivals will employ a panel of 3-4 adjudicators as demanded by the festival.
2. As far as possible, only people on the "Approved Adjudicators" list will be employed as judges for festivals sponsored by the Iowa High School Music Association. To become approved, all candidates must:
(a) have taught successfully for five years in the area they desire to adjudicate;
(b) be recommended, in writing, to the IHSMA office by two people currently on the "Approved Adjudicators" list;
(c) attend a judges' certification clinic as sponsored by the IHSMA or be certified as an Approved Adjudicator by the state association if a resident of another state.
3. Insofar as possible, judges will be assigned to a festival site serving schools from an area other than the judge's community area.
4. No more than one judge from any college may judge the same Large Group event. This does not prevent the use of multiple judges from the same college/university at a festival site provided they are not judging the same event.
5. No person will be employed as an adjudicator who fails to observe the professional obligations of the position; i.e., conferring with other judges prior to their final decision with a given performance, discussing festival performances with unofficial persons and/or attempting to recruit students to a school or summer program.
6. The judge may note lleged violations on the adjudication form, but must still judge and rate the participant without prejudice. It shall be the duty of the festival manager to withhold the rating on the questioned adjudication form for the Executive Director to rule on the alleged violation.
7. WITHHELD RATINGS: Any time an adjudicator feels a performance is in violation of some portion of Association's festival regulations or policies, they are directed to "withhold" the rating. Festival managers are to forward all related materials directly to the Association office at the conclusion of the festival. Involved directors and students should not be allowed access to these documents.
8. The lowa High School Music Association provides official adjudication forms for all festivals of the Association.
9. Judges are instructed the size of the band, orchestra or chorus is not to affect their decision regarding the rating in any manner.
10. Judges remuneration for all festivals will be as follows:
(a) $\$ 175.00$ for a full day contract
(b) $\$ .30$ per mile, round-trip, most direct route.
$\$ .10$ per mile, round-trip, to any judge as a passenger with another judge;
\$. 03 per mile, round-trip, to the driver for every adjudicator they transport
(c) Noon meal furnished by festival site
(d) $\$ 15.00$ food per diem

## LARGE GROUP FESTIVAL REGULATIONS

Participating schools MUST provide adult homeroom supervision or they will not be granted the privilege of a homeroom. An adult supervisor must be present at all times between the points of arrival and departure. Without adult supervisors, no homeroom privileges will be granted.

1. REGISTRATION: Registration fees for the Large Group Festival are as follows:
Large Vocal Groups: \$65.00 Large Instrumental Groups: \$80.00

Registration for this festival will be online. Instructions for registering online will be available on the IHSMA website. No registration fees will be returned once the initial registration deadline has passed. "Same center" changes for this festival will be allowed without penalty, (i.e., changing a Bass Clef Chorus to Mixed Chorus).
2. ELIGIBILITY: In addition to IHSMA Constitution Article VI, Section 1 (Fall Bulletin, No. 231, p. 40), participation is restricted to students from member schools of the lowa High School Music Association and enrolled in grades 7-12. Participating students must be in good standing in their school and currently enrolled and eligible in the respective high school ensemble eligible for participation in the Large Group Music Festival (i.e., woodwind/brass/percussion/sting bass - concert band or orchestra; vocal - mixed chorus/treble clef chorus/bass clef chorus; other strings - orchestra). To be considered a member of the ensemble, a student must be enrolled and in attendance a minimum of 50\% of the scheduled rehearsal sessions. Piano accompanists need not be a member of a large ensemble. Students enrolled in 7-8 grade band or chorus and in attendance at 50\% or more of the rehearsals meet the enrollment requirement for participation in the IHSMA Large Group Festival.
3. Assuming compliance with Regulation No. 2 (above), pupils below the 9th grade may participate in large group events, however, it must be understood that the majority of the ensemble must be of at least 9th grade status.
4. Performance parameters:

There will be a 1 point deduction for every 15 second segment of violation (either minimum or maximum) assessed by each adjudicator. Directors choosing to perform beyond the maximum time limit should notify the timer of their intentions immediately prior to their performance.
5. Each performing ensemble will be judged by a panel of three judges, one of which must provide taped remarks, and the other two have the option of commenting in the medium in which they feel the most comfortable (written or taped).
6. Three sets of conductor's scores must be provided for the convenience of the judges. All measures must be numbered. The official rating from any judge will be lowered one divisional standard if this regulation is not abided.
7. Large Group Festival adjudication forms must be completed in triplicate, in every detail school name, selection, etc. - and postmarked First Class 10 days prior to the festival date to the festival site manager.
8. "Comments Only" entries will be allowed at Large Group Festival. This should be typed BOLDLY on the adjudication forms when they are returned to the festival manager.
9. Schools should not photocopy copyrighted material. Judges will be instructed to withhold all ratings where a violation of this occurs. The Executive Director will disqualify performances in violation of this directive.
10. Schools that register more than one ensemble under any specific caption MUST comply with the duplication of personnel regulation that is in force for all Association-sponsored festival programs.
11. Conductors may not play an instrument in a participating ensemble, hum or sing with the group. Choral Conductors may play the piano accompaniment.
12. Conductors - Only a school approved sponsor, or an eligible student, shall be permitted to direct any participating ensemble. (Article VI - Section 4)
13. Managers are directed to release the adjudication forms and tape comments to directors upon their assurance of departure.
14. Site managers determine performance order. Any requests for performance times must be directed to the site manager. After the performance order has been mailed, schools may find their own "trades", but must remain within the classification and notify the site manager.
15. Electronic instruments specifically called for in the score will be allowed at the Large Group Festival. Electronic instruments may be substituted for the following instruments: harpsichord, celeste, organ and harp. NO acoustic instrumental substitutions will be allowed (i.e. bass keyboard for bass!).
16. An acoustical piano will be allowed for Concert Band performances provided it is played by an eligible student and the basic role filled by this instrument remains supportive in character. Directors employing this option should alert their festival manager to this need so such an instrument will be available.
17. Concert Bands may use up to 5 players total performing on violin, viola, cello, or string bass.
18. Class $3 A$ or $1 A$ member schools with orchestra programs may elect to have their orchestras participate in the Large Group Festival on Saturday at any of the 4A-2A sites that have a panel of string adjudicators for these programs. (Saturday: Cedar Falls, or Cedar Rapids; Friday Evening: Bettendorf, Valley, West Des Moines, and Newton). Send an email immediately after you register online indicating your desire to participate in this option. Without a note, your orchestra will be assigned to the site listed in Large Group Festival sites.
19. If a pianist is used with an orchestra or string orchestra, the pianist must be an eligible student.
20. ORCHESTRA INSTRUMENTATION GUIDELINES:
A. STRING ORCHESTRA: shall consist primarily of string instruments. It may include a harp. It may include a harpsichord or piano. It may include up to two woodwind, brass, and/or percussion players. All players must be eligible students.
B. ORCHESTRA: shall consist of string instruments plus a minimum of 4 woodwind and 2 brass players. Percussion and piano may be included. All players must be eligible students.
21. All vocal events require memorization.
22. Vocal Ensembles and Concert Bands are required to perform, in its entirety, one selection from the Required Music List. This selection must have an asterisk before the title on the adjudication form. The Required Music Lists are available on-line at www.ihsma.org. Copies of these lists can be obtained from the IHSMA office at a cost of \$5.00 each.
23. Concert Bands may petition the Literature Review Committee to allow the performance of literature not found in the Prescribed Literature List by submitting a Literature Petition

Form-Add, score, and recording to the IHSMA prior to February 1. March 1 will serve as the notification date concerning the acceptance or denial of a petition. Literature petition forms can be downloaded from the IHSMA website: www.ihsma.org
24. $2^{\text {nd }}, 3^{\text {rd }}$, etc. vocal ensembles with a membership of at least $50 \%$ freshmen/sophomores from a member school may choose their "required" selections from the next lower level of required literature. This provision applies when two or more ensembles are registered from any member school. If your school enters only one large ensemble in a category, it must choose from the designated levels as printed in the Required Music List.
25. Instrumentalists, to a maximum of four, (in addition to the piano) may be used to accompany Large Vocal Ensembles. All instrumentalists must be eligible students from the participating school. Piano accompaniment may be provided by any school-approved adult. Four-hands at one keyboard permitted. If multiple pianos are used, the second pianist must be an eligible student.
26. The method of presentation of vocal numbers (accompanied or a cappella) is a decision of the director. However, judges will be instructed to address the appropriateness of an accompanied performance of a cappella literature in the "Other Performance Factors" of the adjudication form.
27. To comply with Title IX, The Education Amendments of 1972, it has been ruled that the exclusion of singers from ensembles that meet for academic credit, on the basis of sex alone, is not appropriate. Though no significant membership change, if any, is anticipated, the change in terminology from Boys Chorus to Bass Clef Chorus and from Girls Chorus to Treble Clef Chorus brings our festival program into compliance with federal regulations and allows singers of either sex to participate in either ensemble provided their voice range can meet the requirements of the printed score.
28. Amplification of sound is not permitted for this festival.

## Large Group-Vocal

Vocal performances have an established MINIMUM performance time of 5 minutes and a MAXIMUM performance time of 10 MINUTES.

## Large Group-Orchestra

## 2007 Harris Poll Survey Results

Harris Interactive ${ }^{\circledR}$ conducted this study online within the United States between October 9 and 15, 2007 among 2,565 adults of whom 1,928 had music education. Figures for age, sex, race/ethnicity, education, region and household income were weighted where necessary to bring them into line with their actual proportions in the population. ## INVOLVED IN MUSIC PROGRAM

Overall, three quarters (75\%) of Americans have been involved in some type of music program while in school. In breaking it down by type of music program, chorus or vocal group is most popular, as just over half (51\%) sung in one, while 42 percent took formal instrument lessons and one-third (35\%) played in a school instrumental ensemble. In lesser numbers, 14 percent were part of an informal group and 12 percent took formal vocal lessons. One-quarter (24\%) were part something else involving music and this included being part of theater productions, church choirs, actual classes in school and things involving dance. The more educated one is, the more likely they were involved in a music program of some sort. While two-thirds (65\%) of those with a High School or less education were involved in a music program, that number jumps to four out of five (81\%) of those with just some college education. When you look at those who graduated college, that number goes up to 86 percent and almost nine out of ten (88\%) of those with at least some post graduate work were involved in a music program.

As the table above shows, those with post graduate education are more likely to have partaken in each type of music program, with almost two thirds of this group having been in a chorus or vocal group and/or taken formal instrumental lessons. Also, half of those with a post graduate education have been in a school instrumental ensemble.

## MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING AND DISTRICT ADVISORY GROUP MEETING <br> October 24, 2007

The Executive Committee and District Advisory Group of the Iowa High School Music Association met at 9:00 a.m., October 24, 2007, in Boone, IA. Members of the Executive Committee present were: Tom Nugent, Northwood; Mark Lehmann, Waverly; Leon Kuehner, Hampton; and Susan Stogdill, Malvern. Absent were Tom Dannen, Leon; Todd Lettow, Hampton. Members of the District Advisory Group present were: David Heupel, Jefferson; Tom Gerking, Sloan; Jim Fritz, Decorah; and Daryl Sherman, Lake Mills. Absent were John Long, Victor; and Don Struve, Manning. Also in attendance was Alan Greiner, Executive Director, who served as the recording secretary. Vice-President Kuehner chaired the meeting.

A brief introduction of members present was held. Tom Nugent described the roles and responsibilities of Executive Board members the roles and responsibilities of the District Advisory Group members.

Election Chair Heupel provided a report on the outcome of the Fall Election for Executive Committee. Mark Lehmann was re-elected to the Executive Committee, Term Expiring in 2012. Daryl Sherman Administrative Representative was elected to the District Advisory Group, Terms Expiring 2009. MMS (Nugent/Stogdill) to approve the Election Report as presented. PASSED

MMS (Lehmann/Nugent) to approve the minutes of the July 2, 2007 meeting. PASSED
MMS(Lehmann/Stogdill to approve the financial bills as submitted. PASSED
Director Greiner presented the auditors written report and notified the committee that James Henkel from Henkel and Associates will be in attendance at January's meeting to review the report with them.

ALL-STATE MUSIC FESTIVAL: Director Greiner presented the registration report for the 2007 festival. Participation levels have increased in chorus, but have decreased in all other areas. The overall registration numbers have decreased sixty-two entries. Work details and chaperone availability were determined. MMS (Stogdill/Nugent) to approve Robert Youngquist, Washington; Frank Hoskins, Storm Lake; Pam Crawford, Maquoketa; Allan Yeager, Kuemper Catholic; Millie Younquist, WACO; Scott Keese, Huxley; John Aboud, Algona; David Newport, Grinnell; and Dean Lamp, Glidden as Teacher Tenure Award candidates for this year. PASSED Director Greiner presented the T-shirt, video, and CD sales procedures to be used in Ames. The director presented a progress report on the $62^{\text {nd }}$ Annual Festival. MMS (Nugent/Stogdill) to approve the IPTV Broadcast sponsors as submitted. PASSED The All-State Discipline Hearing policy and All-State Festival Rules were presented and discussed.

MARCHING BAND FESTIVAL: The registration report was presented and explained. This year's event experienced an overall decrease in participation by 1 band. The weather the north half of the state was ideal and the weather for the south half was drizzle most of the morning.

SOLO/SMALL ENSEMBLE FESTIVAL: It was determined that the use of the microphone for Smart Music Accompaniments would be optional and that the regulations and suggestions as developed by the IBA Concert Band Affairs Committee would be adopted. MMS (Nugent/Lehmann) to remove the Duet Caption for Wind/Percussion entries and change the ensemble captions to read 2-6 players; "Choir" captions will now list 7-24 players (percussion maximums will remain unchanged); clarify that ensembles are restricted to one player per part and may not be conducted; clarify that choir entries may have multiple players on a part and may be conducted.; add trumpet choir caption 7-24 players. PASSED

LARGE GROUP FESTIVAL: The director provided an update on the progress of the Literature Recording Project for Grade 2 and Grade 3 literature on the IHSMA Required Literature List for Concert Bands. MMS (Nugent/Lehmann) Concert Bands may use up to 5 players total performing on violin, viola, cello, or string bass. PASSED The director provided an update and demonstration of the online resource of recordings for Grade 2 literature.

DAG CONCERNS and other concerns not covered by the agenda: Jim Fritz made the committee aware of the Traveling Cup Trophy competition sponsored by the Iowa Sports Network and wanted to know if music would be able to participate in the award.
Tom Gerking presented the concerns that were voiced to him about the All-State Audition process and suggestions to review the process used in South Dakota for enhancements. David Heupel spoke about concerns at All-State Auditions and the order of the recall lists, the schedule order at his particular audition site, and concern that the judges at his site should not have to wait outside for the doors to open with the students and directors. He also presented concern over the deadline currently used for accepting vocal alternates. Don Struve presented concerns asking why schools couldn’t combine vocalists and audition together and concerns about judge's holding ballots at Large Group for over an hour.

ASSOCIATION CONCERNS: Those committee members in attendance provided a review of sessions attending and topics found at the National Federation Summer Meeting held in Palm Desert, California this past July. The board was canvassed for topics they would like to see at this next summers meeting. The director reported 65 adjudicators attended certification sessions this past August and September and that 28 New Directors attended the New Director Orientation meetings. A review of the policies of the IHSMA was conducted. MMS (Stogdill/Lehmann) to accept the complimentary Administrator Admission Passes issued by the IHSAA and IGHSAU for all IHSMA events except AllState. PASSED MMS (Nugent/Lehmann) to provide a $\$ 300$ IAAE membership. PASSED MMS (Lehmann/Stogdill) to amend the All-State Penalty Provisions Policy to "Omissions in registration can be added after the Penalty Postmark Deadline by paying an additional $\$ 100.00$ per student penalty PLUS the normal registration fee and late penalty. PASSED Vice-President Kuehner turned the chair over to the director for the purpose of electing officers. MMS (Nugent/Lehmann) to nominate Leon Kuehner for the office of President. Kuehner declined the nomination. MMS (Kuehner/Stogdill) to nominate Todd Lettow for the office of President. PASSED MMS (Stogdill/Lehmann) to nominate Leon Kuehner for the office of Vice-President. PASSED The meeting was turned back over to VicePresident Kuehner. MMS (Lehmann/Stogdill) to nominate Tom Dannen for the office of Treasurer. PASSED MMS With no further business to conduct the meeting was adjourned.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE IOWA HIGH SCHOOL MUSIC ASSOCIATION <br> Amended April 2003 

## ARTICLE I

Name
Section 1. This Association shall be known as the lowa High School Music Association.
Purpose
Section 2. It shall exist for the purpose of furthering interest and establishing standards in all forms of high school music

## Membership

Section 3. Only high schools accredited or approved by the State Department of Education and meeting the requirements of this Constitution are eligible for membership in this Association. Junior high schools are not accepted for membership in this Association. Students enrolled in a junior high school may participate under the auspices of the senior high schools of the school district in which it is located. In case the district includes more than one senior high school, the Superintendent of the school shall designate the high school with which the junior high school is to be affiliated for participation in the activities of the Association.

## Annual Meeting

Section 4. The Annual Meeting shall be held during the month of July. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Committee.

## ARTICLE II <br> Festivals

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall have authority to arrange such festivals as they may deem necessary.

## ARTICLE III <br> Dues

Section 1. Annual dues of $\$ 25$ shall be sent to the Executive Director of the Association on or before September 15. Dues shall be $\$ 37.50$ ( $\$ 25$ dues plus $\$ 12.50$ penalty) until January 1. After January 1, schools will not be admitted for membership. The postmark on the envelope containing the letter shall determine the date the fee is received.

## ARTICLE IV Administration

## A. Executive Committee: Nomination and election, powers and duties.

Section 1. The Executive Committee composed of 5 members shall be elected at-large for a 5-year term: Three members of the committee shall be Superintendents or Principals of senior high member schools; one member shall represent the instrumental field and one member shall represent the vocal field of senior high member schools. Note: The Executive Committee has an additional member appointed by the State School Board Association. This is to meet the new statute 257.25, Chapter 9.4, Code 1966. The total membership of the committee is 6.
Section 2. A member of the Executive Committee shall be eligible to succeed him(her)-self but once and serve a total of two(2) terms (either partial or full).
Section 3. Only the Superintendent or his/her designated senior high school Principal shall have the right to vote in the nomination and election of Executive Committee members.
Section 4. Nomination and Election - When an election is to take place, the Executive Director of the lowa High School Music Association shall mail an official nomination ballot to each member school by September 10th. This ballot shall be a secret ballot enclosed in a blank envelope, sealed and mailed in an official mailing envelope provided for that purpose. These sealed ballots, when voted, shall be mailed to the member of the District Advisory Group from the North Central District, who shall serve as the chair of the Election Board. The election chair and the Executive Director shall select a music teacher or administrator from the chair's school to complete the Election Committee.

On or before September 15, the Election Board shall meet for the official canvass of the ballots. The official mailing envelopes shall be opened in the presence of the Election Board and the sealed ballots removed and placed in a ballot box. After having been thoroughly mixed, the sealed ballots shall be opened, counted and the results announced. The two receiving the highest number of votes shall be considered the nominees. In case of a tie of more than two, all those in the tie shall be considered nominees. In case the number of nomination ballots for any one of the nominees is a majority of the number of member schools, that candidate shall be declared elected.

A list of schools voting shall be made from the return on the official mailing envelopes, and together with the results of the election, be certified by the Election Board conducting the election and
forwarded to the Executive Committee for publication in the next regular bulletin. A place shall be provided on the official mailing envelope for the signature of the school official casting the vote. The signature must be on the official mailing envelope in longhand.

The Executive Director shall then prepare official election ballots and mail immediately to the member schools. These ballots shall be the same kind as those used for nominations and, when voted, shall be mailed to the same Election Board Chair who received the nomination ballots. This ballot shall only contain the names of those individuals declared nominees through the process described above. On or before October 10, the Election Board shall meet to canvass the election ballots. The procedure in canvassing shall be the same as in canvassing nomination ballots. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. A list of schools voting shall be made from the return of the official mailing envelopes, and together with the results of the election, certified by the Election Board conducting the election and forwarded to the Executive Committee for publication in the next regular bulletin of the Music Association. In case of a tie, election shall be decided by lot by the candidates in the presence of the Executive Committee.
Section 5. Each newly-elected officer becomes a member of the Executive Committee upon notification from the Executive Director of his/her election.
Section 6. A vacancy will occur whenever a member of the Executive Committee ceases to be an executive officer or a teacher of music, as earlier defined, of a member senior high school. In case of a vacancy, the Executive Committee shall conduct an election in the prescribed manner within two weeks (except during the summer) after the vacancy has occurred to fill and complete the unexpired term. When a vacancy occurs during the summer vacation, the Executive Committee may, at its discretion, delay an election to fill the vacancy until the regular time in the fall.
Section 7. At their October meeting, the Executive Committee shall elect a President, Vice-President and Treasurer from its membership for a term of office for one year. Other officers may be elected by the Executive Committee from within its own group to carry on the business of the Association.
Item 1. The President of the Executive Committee shall, in addition to his regular duties, preside at all meetings of the District Advisory Group.
Item 2. Three members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum for any meeting.

## Powers and Duties of the Executive Committee

Section 8. The Executive Committee shall have the following powers and duties.
a. The Executive Committee shall annually negotiate for an extension of the agreement with the lowa High School Athletic Association to act as a service agent for the Music Association in accordance with the provisions set forth in the resolution adopted by the Music Association on November 14, 1965, and amended on January 14, 1966. Modifications from the original resolution may be made from time to time by mutual agreement of both Executive Boards or the Executive Committee may, at its discretion, determine other conditions under which its Executive Director may serve.
b. The Executive Committee shall have general supervision over all music festivals and related music activities of member schools.
c. It shall interpret the rules of the Association.
d. It shall provide for and supervise the purchase of suitable awards by member schools for participants.
e. It shall decide all protests and shall fix the penalty unless otherwise provided in the rules.

Section 9. The Executive Committee shall present a full report of all official business through a bulletin distributed to all members of the Association. The Executive Director and Treasurer shall annually present a financial statement to the Association, together with an audit by a Certified Public Accountant of the previous fiscal year. An Audit Committee consisting of 3 to 5 representatives of member schools shall be appointed by the President if such action is requested.
Section 10. In matters not herein determined, the Executive Committee shall have absolute authority.
Section 11. The Executive Committee may create and place on interest a sinking fund, which shall be used only to pay a deficit in the finances of the Association, unless otherwise specifically designated for other use by the electorate.
Section 12. The Association, acting by and through the Executive Committee, may accept contributions and bequests for the purpose of awarding scholarships that conform to the standards promulgated by the Internal Revenue Service and the Iowa Department of Revenue. The requirements and qualifications of the scholarship award will be communicated annually to the member schools.

## B. District Advisory Group: Nomination and election powers and duties.

Section 1. There is hereby created a District Advisory Group and for the purpose of election and administration of said District Advisory Group, there shall be 6 districts as at present provided. The Districts as established as follows:

Northwest District comprising the following counties: Buena Vista, Carroll, Cherokee, Clay, Crawford, Dickinson, Ida, Lyon, Monona, O'Brien, Osceola, Plymouth, Sac, Sioux, Woodbury.
North Central District comprising the following counties: Butler, Calhoun, Cerro Gordo, Emmet, Floyd, Franklin, Grundy, Hamilton, Hancock, Hardin, Humboldt, Kossuth, Mitchell, Palo Alto, Pocahontas, Webster, Winnebago, Worth, Wright.
Northeast District comprising the following counties: Allamakee, Benton, Black Hawk, Bremer, Buchanan, Chickasaw, Clayton, Clinton, Delaware, Dubuque, Fayette, Howard, Jackson, Jones, Linn, Tama, Winneshiek.
Southwest District comprising the following counties: Adair, Adams, Audubon, Cass, Fremont, Guthrie, Harrison, Mills, Montgomery, Page, Pottawattamie, Ringgold, Shelby, Taylor, Union.
South Central District comprising the following counties: Appanoose, Boone, Clarke, Dallas, Decatur, Greene, Jasper, Lucas, Madison, Marion, Marshall, Monroe, Polk, Story, Warren, Wayne.
Southeast District comprising the following counties: Cedar, Davis, Des Moines, Henry, lowa, Jefferson, Johnson, Keokuk, Lee, Louisa, Mahaska, Muscatine, Poweshiek, Scott, Van Buren, Wapello, Washington.
Section 2. Any certified employee serving as a high school administrator or high school music instructor is eligible to be elected to the District Advisory Group.
Section 3. A District Advisory Group member shall be eligible for only one elected term in office.
Section 4. Only the Superintendent or his delegated Principal of the senior high school shall have the right to vote in the nomination and election of District Advisory Group members.
Section 5. The term of office for members of the District Advisory Group shall be for 3 years. The areas of representation shall be rotated so that each district will be represented, in turn, by an administrator, an instrumental music director and a vocal music director. Beginning with the 1981 election, the Southwest District shall elect an administrator, the South Central District shall elect an instrumental music director and the Southeast District shall elect a vocal music director. The 1982 election shall direct the Northwest District to elect an instrumental music director, the North Central District shall elect a vocal music director and the Northeast District shall elect an administrator.
Section 6. Procedures for nomination and election of members to the District Advisory Group shall be identical to that prescribed in the nomination and election of members to the Executive Committee, except that members to the District Advisory Group shall be elected by Districts and voting shall be by Districts and not at-large.
Section 7. The District Advisory Group shall meet with the Executive Committee at their October and April meetings. The Executive Committee may call other meetings of the Advisory Group.

## ARTICLE V

## State Festivals

Section 1. The State Festivals shall be held on dates established by the lowa High School Activities Federation.
Section 2. Registration for any Association festival must be completed by at least 30 days prior to the festival in which the school is participating.

## Program and Certification

Section 3. The certification of eligibility of participating pupils must be sent to the Executive Director with the official registration.

## Judges for Festivals

Section 4. All judges will be selected and employed by the Executive Committee. No person shall be selected as a judge for an event who has coached any of the participants, or who is in any way connected with the schools represented by the participants.
All solo and small group events shall be judged by one judge. The Executive Committee shall determine the appropriate number of judges required by each of the large group events.

## Rating of Participants

Section 5. The Executive Committee of the Iowa High School Music Association retains the authority to establish the rating system that will be utilized for each festival event.

## Festival Reports

Section 6. A complete report giving the final ratings of all participants must be mailed to the Executive Director of the Association by the manager of each festival promptly following the completion of the event.

## ARTICLE VI <br> Eligibility

Section 1. All participants must be enrolled and in good standing in a school that is a member or associate member in good standing with the lowa High School Music Association. All
participants must be under 20 years of age. All participants shall be enrolled students of the school and in good standing; they shall be enrolled in at least four full-credit subjects, each of one period or "hour" or the equivalent thereof, at all times. Coursework taken under the provisions of lowa Code chapter 261C, postsecondary enrollment options, for which a school district or accredited nonpublic school grants academic credit toward high school graduation shall be used in determining eligibility.

Each contestant shall be passing all coursework for which credit is given and shall be making adequate progress toward graduation requirements at the end of each grading period. "Grading period," graduation requirements, and any interim periods of ineligibility are determined by local policy. For the purposes of this rule, "grading period" shall mean the period of time at the end of which a student in grades 9 through 12 receives a final passing grade and course credit is awarded.

If at the end of any grading period a participant receives a failing grade in any course for which credit is awarded, the participant is ineligible to participate in any competitive event sanctioned by the IHSMA or any IHSMA sponsored event that is non-graded (event doesn't effect course GPA) within a period of 30 consecutive school days. The period of ineligibility will begin with the first school day following the day grades are issued by the school district.

A student with a disability who has an individualized education program (IEP) shall not be denied eligibility on the basis of scholarship if the student is making adequate progress, as determined by school officials, towards the goals and objectives on the student's individualized education program.

The maximum period of eligibility while in grades 7 and 8 shall be 4 semesters. The maximum period of eligibility while in grades 9 through 12 shall be 8 semesters. Pupils below the 9th grade may not participate in solo events.

A soloist, except piano, must be a member of the appropriate high school musical organization, if such exists, and must appear with that organization if it participates in any of the programs of the Association.

## Classification

Section 2. The classification of member schools shall be determined by the Executive Committee and reviewed on an annual basis. The Association shall use the current year's official 9-11 enrollment as reported on the BEDS document to the IHSAA to determine classifications for the ensuing year. There will be a minimum of four classes that will divide the membership into classes of relative equal opportunity for students. Classifications are as follows:

Class 4A: 9-11 enrollment of 600 or more students
Class 3A: 9-11 enrollment of 275-599 students
Class 2A: 9-11 enrollment of 150-274 students
Class 1A: 9-11 enrollment of 149 or less students
Each school shall enter the class where it belongs as shown by the above classification except as hereinafter provided. A school may elect to participate in the class next highest in enrollment, in which case it shall participate in that class in each event it enters. The choice to enter a next higher classification shall not be made later than May $1^{\text {st }}$ of the preceding school year.

## Number of Entries

Section 3. There is an unlimited entry for member schools into the large group festival provided there is no duplication of personnel.

The number of participants or entries into the various programs of the Association will be set by the Executive Committee and may vary from program to program.

## Time Limit

The time limit of each event shall be as prescribed by the Executive Committee. The time will be computed from the beginning of the first selection. An official timekeeper shall signal when the time limit has been reached. Entrants who do not stop as the signal is given shall be reported to the Executive Committee by the festival manager.

If directors do not comply with this direction, they shall be reported to the Executive Committee and announcements of rating withheld.

## Conductors and Accompanists

Section 4. Only a school approved sponsor, or an eligible student, shall be permitted to direct any participating organization. Directors of vocal groups may not sing with their organizations or may directors of instrumental groups play with participating instrumental organizations.
This shall not be interpreted to prevent a vocal director playing a piano accompaniment for a participating group.
Small groups, both vocal and instrumental, must participate without direction unless exception is provided by the Executive Committee.
The accompanist may be any person approved by the Superintendent of the member school.
ARTICLE VII
Violations
Section 1. Schools violating this constitution or adopted rules, policies and regulations of the lowa High School Music Association may be penalized, up to and including suspension from membership for one year, by action of the Executive Committee. Any suspended school will forfeit all ratings and awards received in the alleged occurrence.
Section 2. If charges are brought against any member school for violations, as generally described in Article 7, Section 1, the Executive Committee shall consider such charges and determine and assess penalties in case of conviction. Any school which is charged with such violations shall be given the opportunity to be represented at the hearing of its case before the Executive Committee. Any investigation or hearing which involves the school with which any member of the Executive Committee is connected shall not be heard in his/her presence, nor shall he/she vote on the final consideration. The decision of the Executive Committee in said matters is final.

## ARTICLE VIII

## Disposition of Assets on Dissolution

Section 1. In the event of the termination or dissolution of this Association, then and in that event, the assets remaining after payment of the costs of termination or dissolution, shall be paid out in equal amounts to all schools which were members of the Association on the date of the commencement of such action to terminate or dissolve.

## Performance Etiquette for Attending Fine Arts Events

- Please refrain from talking during the performance.
o While you may only be whispering it does create a distraction for those around you.
o This also includes whispering to or disciplining your other children
- Please turn off/silence all pagers, cell phones, and watch alarms.
o These can be very distracting to the performers and others in the audience
- Do not wave to your child/friend during the performance.
o This creates a distraction for the performer and others in the audience
- Refrain from using flash photography during the performance.
o Flash photography is a distraction and creates a dangerous atmosphere for the performers
- Applaud at appropriate times.
o Formal Concert - at the end of each selection not after each movement.
o Jazz Concert - at the end of each selection or to recognize the efforts of a soloist.
o Theatre Production - after each act/scene.
- Do not leave as soon as your child's portion of the performance is over.
o All of the students deserve a full audience for their performances.
o Remember that the next time, your child's performance might be scheduled last.
o In the contest/festival environment it is appropriate to leave once the door has been opened.
- Do not leave while the performance is in progress.
o If you need to use the restroom do so between musical numbers or between scenes.
- Arrive at the performance with a positive attitude.
o Your child is sensitive to your attitude towards their performance. Their performance may very well reflect your attitude.
